Problem stifles in Walkers.....

I have a 5 yr old walking horse that we have raised from birth that, quite frankly, had a troubled beginning. This horse was undernourished at birth, was a very typical walker with the long legs and pasterns that were set, literally, at a 90 degree angle. She couldn't stand on her own without help from myself or my husband. As a result, she did not get enough colostrum and ultimately had to spend the first week of life at the local vet for care. As a result, foot and stifle issues have developed into a concern for me. I consider myself a responsible, intelligent horse owner with maintaining a healthy balance of feed and hoof care for both of our horses; however, increased "catching" of my horse's stifles and "seedy" toe with my 5 yr old have increased my concerns. I have researched treatments such as supplements and injections have discussed my concerns with my vet and had even talked with my farrier, one that I had used for the past 3-4 years. The advice given to me was exercising up and down hills, to develop the muscle around the stifle, possible surgery, glucosamine supplements, injections, etc. Then I met Martin Kenny from the Hoof Center.

I actually moved next door to Martin about 3 summers ago. I became good friends with both he and his wife Diane. We have talked many times about horses and have even joked about how peculiar I am about my horses' feet and how they are trimmed and shod.

As a result of our friendship, we were both very hesitant about his doing any work on my horses; however, due to the increased "catching" of my 5 yr old's stifles, I put my personal quirks aside and asked him to take a look, that was 4 weeks ago on Saturday, May 14, 2011. Martin trimmed and shod both my 5 yr old and my 4 yr old walking horses for the first time.

I learned a great deal on that day. I learned that neither horse had adequate concavity in any of their feet, basically, "flat feet". Martin also took the time to explain the reason for the hoof cracking, quarter cracking, and flaring, how it got there and why I was continuing to have the problem. I learned that my 4 yr old was having a moderate problem with hoof wall separation, a problem that I was completely unaware of and a problem that can be very serious if unchecked. Due to this horse having white feet we had been aware of "bruising" on the outer hoof wall, we could see it, but had been told that she had hit her foot and had just some minor bruising. THIS IS NOT TRUE, if there are no rocks or other debris in your pasture and you have bruising on the exterior hoof, please believe me, this is a far more serious problem than you realize.

After all was said and done, on Sunday, my husband and I went riding @ Uwharrie State Park. Oh boy, was that a ride. My 5 yr, honestly, for the first time, actually wanted to go riding. My arms were so sore the next day from keeping her in check. For 5 hrs this horse eagerly went up and down, and up and down, the hills. She was so comfortable in her movements, not for me but for her. She had more head bobbing and she was much more loose in the hip for a further reach up underneath.

On Sunday, June 12, 2011 we had a 2nd trimming and shoeing. In just 4 weeks, there has been some increase in concavity of their feet, NO flaring of any of the feet, and most importantly, there was no teeth gritting "popping" of my 5 yr old's stifles. Martin did say that she was still a little loose, but she was not catching and sticking at all.

We still have some work to do. Hoof care is an ongoing process, maintenance basically. You can't just fix your problem today or in my case just 4 weeks and then go back to what you were doing, why would you want to.
